Join Civil Air Patrol's Congressional Squadron

Civil Air Patrol is a world-class aviation organization that is both a nonprofit corporation chartered by Congress and the official U.S. Air Force auxiliary. This unique dual status allows CAP to provide low-cost aerial platforms with advanced technologies for communities, states, and the federal government. The average operating cost of CAP is \$170 per flight hour, a fraction of the cost of using military aircraft.

The Congressional Squadron is a nonpartisan, volunteer organization made up of members of Congress, congressional staff, and aviation professionals. For over 50 years the squadron has supported emergency operations, youth development, and education.

Membership in the Congressional Squadron provides members of Congress and staff an opportunity to:

- Show their support for CAP units in their state and district;
- Sponsor two aircraft used for operational missions; and
- Participate in CAP programs as schedules permit.

Members of Congress participate as much or as little as desired — there is no obligation. Most are members to show support for CAP volunteers and programs such as youth development, community service, and lifesaving operations in their state/district. Some become active participants in various CAP programs, especially its flight operations.

Orientation flights and briefings are offered to members of Congress and staff to help gain a more indepth understanding of CAP operations. Opportunities are also available to become qualified aircrew (pilots, observers, scanners, and photographers) and participate in missions.

The squadron includes more than 400 current and retired members of Congress and staff. Members of Congress join at the grade of lieutenant colonel.
